COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Sculpture is a synthesis of space, materials, techniques, and ideas. In this course, students will learn a basic foundation of sculptural processes using plaster, wood, wire, and found materials in order to develop visual and conceptual modes of working. Both figurative and non-figurative references will be used to inform and encourage historical and contemporary sensitivity within personal practice.

RECOMMENDED MATERIALS:

Sketchbook, acrylic paints (optional)

MATERIALS PROVIDED:

Cardboard, plaster, wire, wood, hardware, hot glue, paintbrushes

PROJECTS:

Ice Breaker- Stacked objects

After discussing the ready-made, everyone will divide into teams— each group will formulate a concept for their sculpture, and each group member will return from lunch with one found object. Individual objects will be combined to create a collaborative work. Remember, the use of found objects implicates the history of each object, and each group must work to decide how these items create meaning.

Project 1: Frankenstein Project

This project will be a continuation of previous themes: found objects, assemblage, and the readymade. This time, you will be required to alter your object by any means necessary, (smashing, deconstructing, augmenting, adding audio etc.) You will also be asked to incorporate additional fabricated elements to contextualize or subsume your chosen object. A casting demonstration will be given if anyone wishes to replicate objects as part of their alteration.

Project 2: Parody

Take some time to go through the sculpture library and find a sculptor whose work you absolutely hate. Imitate the style of this artist's work with deliberate exaggeration for comic effect.

Final Project: Self-Portrait Project based on Paul Thek

Paul Thek's "Teaching Notes" consist of 109 queries that address individual narrative within subjects ranging from personal data to philosophical perspectives. For this project, each student will create a 'self-portrait' based upon their responses to questions 1 through 109.

Grading will be based on individual progress determined by:

- -Attendance and participation 60%
- -Homework assignments/ projects- 40%
